Commander's Corner

New Non-Smoking Policy, Relaunch Party, and Increase of Family Breakfast Price



Based on a recommendation by the House Committee and the 2025 Post Survey results, the Executive Committee has approved a change to the House Rules. On February 4, 2025, the Executive Committee

agreed to ban smoking at our post and allow the change to the House Rules effective February 11, 2025.

What drove this decision? Revenue for the post is at an all-time low due to two factors: low attendance and the new Virginia Gaming Commission regulations stating that we must give 20% of our gaming proceeds to charity. This means we are running \$5k on average in the red a month. This is not sustainable.

Attendance must improve in order for the post to survive. We conducted a survey to figure out why our members are not coming into the post. The survey revealed that 64% of the respondents (Legionnaires) do not come into the post due to smoking. Both the SAL and Auxiliary surveys agreed that smoking needs to stop.

Thank you all for participating in the post survey. We listened and will take the comments and other suggestions to heart. Many of you made a commitment to attend more events and volunteer with these new changes. We are counting on YOU to come in more often and keep our post afloat.

March 1st Post Relaunch Party: On March 1st, we will be celebrating a "relaunch party" for the post as a non-smoking facility. We need your support! We will have Karaoke that night, food, and fun. And no, you do not have to sing. Please

make plans to attend this event and other events to get us back on track financially.

Family Breakfast: I am sure I don't have to tell anyone that there is an egg shortage. Our SAL works very hard to keep the breakfast reasonably priced, but this is out of their control. Effective immediately, they need to raise the price from \$12 a person to \$15. Although we regret this change, it must be made.

For those members who have not heard, we were told by the Fire Marshall in 2024 that our sprinkler system heads had to be replaced, ASAP. The sprinkler heads have been installed in the bar and we have passed inspection!

There is some drywall work that must be completed, smoke eaters removed, and a complete paint job with a cigarette smoke retardant applied.

Again, we will be asking for donations, with a target of \$3,500 to complete this work. If you are at a post event, you can donate then or send a donation made out to "American Legion, Post 1976" with "drywall donation" in the memo section.

In closing, please consider volunteering at the post with whatever talent and time you have. We need volunteers to help set up for events, serve food, and clean after events. We cannot function without your help.

Chaplain's Report

The District 17's Four Chaplains Memorial Service was on Sunday, Feb. 2, at Post 177 Fairfax. The guest speaker was active duty Army Chaplain (COL) Eddie Cook.

The Four Chaplains were four World War II chaplains who died rescuing civilian and military personnel as the American troop ship SS Dorchester sank on February 3, 1943, in what has been referred to as the second-worst sea disaster of WW II. The ship left New York on January 23, 1943, en route to Greenland, carrying approximately 900 as part of a convoy of three ships escorted by the Coast Guard. During the early morning hours of February 3, the vessel was torpedoed by the German submarine U-223 off Newfoundland in the North Atlantic. The chaplains helped the other soldiers board lifeboats and gave up their own life jackets when the supply ran out. The chaplains joined arms, said prayers, and sang hymns as they went down with the ship.

Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is celebrated annually on February 14. The Wikipedia website states that it originated as a Christian feast day honoring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and, through later folk traditions, has become a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world. In the United States, about 190 million Valentine's Day cards are sent each year, not including the

hundreds of millions of cards school children exchange.

Lord, in your very being we discover the essence of true love. You are the Lover, the Beloved, and the Love that flows between us and among us. Empower me today to be a person of deeper love, encompassing heart, soul, mind, and strength, both for you and for those around me.

- Sharpen my awareness of those who feel unloved and unlovable. Strengthen my resolve to be an agent of hospitality to the lonely, of comfort for the frightened, and mercy for the hurting.
- Open my heart to a greater sense of your love for me. A love that is tenacious, patient, and unconditional. Remove the barriers that I have built that block the free flow of your love in my life.

Loving God, in you I find my truest and best self, as one created in your image. Thank you for your grace, and thank you for your love. Amen.

was founded by members of the American Expeditionary Force at a meeting in Paris. Two months later, the American Legion adopted its official name and the preamble to the organization's constitution was drafted. And on June 9, 1919, the emblem was adopted.



To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the American Legion, the U.S. Postal Service officially issued a 6-cent commemorative stamp in March 1969 to honor the end of the Paris Caucus that formed the organization.

Club Manager's Report

I'm sad to report to you that our post is in an unfortunate predicament. Through no fault of anyone, we are at a crossroads and do not make enough funds to support the post. Since Covid, we have lost around 250 members.

We used to make a good amount of money on the gaming machines but, due to a new Virginia Gaming Commission regulation introduced last year, we now have to give most of it away. We have to give 50% to the company that owns the machines (Grover Gaming) and 20% to charities, per the law. So, we have to give 70% of it away—and this is based on the gross that we make before taxes, not the net.

You might be asking, what are the other clubs doing? Not all of them are doing so well, either. The ones that are doing well are the ones that rent out their hall for lots of money. Also, the bigger ones that are not in this predicament have about three times the members.

So, some solutions are to push harder to rent our hall and get new members, which are not easy tasks with so many other clubs in the area. I have advertised everywhere that I know to do so. We have also sent out 3,000 postcards asking veterans in the area to join. Tommy Kemp helped me with that and helped me send out renewal letters this year.

After a recent employee meeting discussing ways we could come up with more money to keep the post afloat until it is in a better situation, I decided to take a pay cut and three of our bartenders have offered to work off the clock as volunteers to get the payroll down.

Here are some other ways we have cut costs and brought in new revenue sources for the post:

- The cleaning crew no longer comes in on Sunday and Monday nights. Our commander Dorothy Vigano does the cleaning on Monday mornings.
- Worked with the trash company to reduce the bill by \$200.
- Got the Verizon bill lowered by \$200.

We now rent the hall three days a week—Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday—and the 2nd Saturday of the month to Doug Adair of ORS for \$550 a month. ORS is the company that gives the food handlers class, test, and license.

I certainly welcome any suggestions and potential solutions you all may have to help out our post and get back to a better financial situation. We all love the post and do not want to see it this way. I would be most grateful if you all could help by getting people to rent our hall for \$25 per hour, trying to recruit new members, volunteering to run an event, and/or just coming in, bringing your friends, and supporting the post.

SAL also participates in the monthly Legion Breakfast, held on the third Sunday of the month. SAL and Legion members do the cooking and are assisted by other Legion and Auxiliary members to distribute the breakfast plates and clean up after breakfast is over. This is an occasion we can be proud of in our post/squadron, and the number of folks who come out for the Legion Breakfast is very significant. We are extremely proud of turning out this breakfast each month.

SAL participates with other post functions in donations to veterans events and supports many veterans' activities. Recently SAL provided a \$500 check to the Annandale High School PTSA, specifically the food pantry, which provides needed food to many of the high school families who are in financial need. It is a beneficial and much-needed donation and can be sent by any organization in our post at any time; just designate the donation for the AHS Food Pantry.
